

## Articles

In general, articles are used before nouns to show whether you are referring to a specific thing, group, or situation or a general concept or category. *The* is a definite article whereas *a* or *an* are indefinite articles.

### Examples:

*Students often have reading lists.*

*First-year students are sent a reading list for each subject.*

*The students enrolled in the thermodynamics course were sent the reading list before the start of term.*

### General rules:

Use no article to **refer to any and all examples of a general group or category.**

*Dogs bark.*

Use *a/an* to **refer to an example of a specified group or type.**

*A dog is barking.*

Use *the* to **specify a particular known thing or group.**

*The annoying dog over there is barking.*

### The vs. a/an (definite articles vs. indefinite articles):

Use *the* to **refer to a whole class or species.**

*The African elephant has larger ears than the Indian elephant.*

*The homeless are most vulnerable to this disease.*

We sometimes use *the* + adjective to **refer to a group: the homeless, the elderly, the disabled.**

Use *a/an* to **refer to any example of a class or species.**

*A nurse practitioner must attend university longer than a registered nurse.*

*Migration may result in the generations of a family living in different places.*

### When moving from unspecified to specified:

Use *a/an* when **mentioning something for the first time** in a text, and use *the* when something is already known to the reader.

*Researchers at TUM conducted a survey into student attitudes towards recycling.*

*More than 2,000 students participated in the survey. (= the survey that has already been mentioned)*

*The US Geological survey recorded an active volcano in Hawaii.*

*The volcano erupted at 18:41 local time. (= the volcano that has already been mentioned)*

### Plural countable nouns:

Plural countable nouns are used either with *the* or no article. In academic writing, we often use a plural noun with no article to **refer to a general group or category**.

*Cell phones have changed the world fundamentally in many ways.*

*Per capita, people in developing countries produce less waste than in developed countries.*

We need *the* before a plural noun that **refers to a specific group**.

*A virus damaged data stored on the company's phones.*

*About 40% of the people affected by this condition are men.*

### Uncountable and abstract nouns:

We often use uncountable and abstract nouns with no article to **refer to a general category, process, or concept**.

*New technology has changed the world in many ways.*

*Streamlining the ordering process can often increase efficiency.*

Uncountable and abstract nouns are sometimes used with *the* to **refer to a specific example or situation**.

*The new technology reduced preparation time by 50 percent.*

*The reorganization of the system greatly increased the efficiency of the ordering process.*
